An Open Game (or Double King's Pawn Opening) is a chess opening that begins with the following moves: 1. e4 e5 White has moved the king's pawn two squares and Black has replied in kind. The result is an Open Game.

If you are playing black, you likely want a good response prepared for 1.e4, white's most popular opening move. White has many reasonable options for their first move, and black has a host of responses after white plays e4.. In fact, all 20 possible black moves have been tried in this position, and almost all of them are reasonable, and at least half of those have been tried often enough to be ...

Ways for Black to Respond to 1.e4 in Chess

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Playing 1. E4 E5 : A Classical Repertoire by Nikolaos ...

1...e5 is Black's classical response to 1.e4. By mirroring White's move, Black grabs an equal share of the centre and scope to develop some pieces. 1...e5 is one of the few moves that directly interferes with White's plan of playing d4.
