The American Academy of Family Physicians recommends against routine screening for testicular cancer in asymptomatic adolescent and adult males 6. The American Academy of Pediatrics does not include screening for testicular cancer in its recommendations for preventive health care 7.

Testicular self-exam Hold your penis out of the way and examine each testicle separately. Hold your testicle between your thumbs and fingers with both hands and roll it gently between your fingers. Look and feel for any hard lumps or nodules (smooth rounded masses) or any change in the size, shape, ...

Testicular Cancer Screening | Early Testicular Cancer Testing

In patients with stage I NSGCT undergoing surveillance after orchiectomy, clinicians should perform a physical examination and obtain serum tumor markers (AFP, hCG +/- LDH) every 2-3 months in year 1, every 2-4 months in year 2, every 4-6 months in year 3, and every 6-12 months for years 4 and 5.

Screening for Testicular Cancer: Recommendation Statement ...

Most often, testicular cancer can be found at an early stage. Many men find the cancer themselves while performing a self-examination. Or a man's sexual partner may notice a change that leads to a diagnosis. Some doctors recommend that men ages 15 to 55 perform a monthly self-examination to find any changes.

It is estimated that 8,720 new cases of testicular cancer will be diagnosed in men, and 380 men will die of this disease in the United States in 2016.[1] Testicular cancer is the most common malignancy in men aged 15 to 34 years.[2,3] It accounts for approximately 1% of all cancers in men. Worldwide, testicular cancer has more than doubled in the last 40 years.

Testicular cancer screening A self-exam is the best way to detect this cancer early. UMMC Cancer Center and Research Institute doctors recommend that, beginning in their teens, men examine their testicles monthly. Knowing the normal shape, size, and weight of the testicles will help detect any changes, should any occur.

In 2004, the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommended against screening for testicular cancer because of its relative rarity, the lack of evidence showing the accuracy of clinical or self-examination, and highly favorable outcomes from treatment.
